BUY LAND FOR SCHOOL AMERICAN SCHOOL PROPOSED FOR GUADALAJARA. MAY BE OPENED THIS FALL

Site Acquired for New School at a Cost of \$5,500—E. S. Banks Is Elected President of Board—Other New Officers.

Guadalajara, April 26.—A block of 3,500 square meters of land has been purchased as a site for a permanent American school in Guadalajara, and the erection of a school building is to be undertaken at once. The purchase of the land was reported to the stockholders of the American School association by the board of directors at the annual meeting here, and the stockholders formally approved the board's action and authorized it to immediately make arrangements for the erection of a building. It is expected that the fall term will open with the American school in its new home.

JEWELRY MEN INDIGNANT OVER HOAX OF TELEGRAM

Special Dispatch to The Herald. Guadalajara, April 26.—"Your brother, Ernest Woog, has been assassinated here."

This was the substance of a telegram received here by Max Woog, assistant manager of the local branch of La Esmeralda, the Mexico City jewelry house. It bore the name of J. Bloch, head of the concern in the national capital.

Ernest Woog, manager of the local branch, had left this city a few days previous to visit Mr. Bloch in Mexico City, and naturally his brother took it for granted that the telegram was bona fide. As soon as he recovered from the shock caused by the news of his brother's death he hurried to the telegraph office and sent a message to Mr. Bloch asking for details of the murder.

In due time two telegrams reached the Guadalajara man, one from Mr. Bloch and the other from Ernest Woog. The former party declared the first telegram a malicious hoax, and the latter declined emphatically to admit his assassination. The messages changed Max Woog's grief into indignation.

Ernest Woog has returned to Guadalajara from Mexico City, and has placed the "assassination" telegram in the hands of the local authorities. They are now endeavoring to find the man who sent it. Mr. Woog suspects a Guadalajara man who is now in Mexico City, and who, he states, has been in the habit of sending telegrams of such a nature. This individual, Mr. Woog says, poses as a great practical joker. If he can be connected with the Woog telegram a criminal accusation will be filed against him.

ENGINEER RENDERS REPORT ON CHUVISCAR RIVER DAM

Special Dispatch to The Herald. Chihuahua, April 26.—Engineer Enrique Esperon, inspector of the great dam being built on the Chuviscar river to increase the supply of water for this capital, has submitted his report of the condition and progress of the work, and states what is necessary to complete it. There can be no doubt now that the contractors, McQuatters, Truhead and company will have it finished in June in ample time to get the benefit of the coming rainy season and never again will there be a shortage of water for this city.

Engineer Esperon says that from September 1, 1907, to March 30, 1908, 23,000 cubic meters of excavation work was done and that 14,852 cubic meters of stone masonry and 2,122 cubic meters of concrete work were built. He gives the total cost of the work to date at \$775,732. To complete the work he says will take \$90,836.63 and the following is the work yet to be done: 100 cubic meters of cement work, 115 cubic meters of stone masonry, 240 square meters of finishing touches, and 2,500 square meters of cement work above and below the dam.

CIRCULATING BOGUS MONEY

Woman Is Arrested in the Act at Monterey.

Monterey, April 26.—Counterfeit money is again circulating in this city, but the authorities are confident that it is not being made here, believing the counterfeiters are merely agents of a green goods factory in another state. Maria Pascuala Martinez was caught in the act of passing fifty-cent pieces in different places yesterday, managing to escape the first time but being apprehended the second time by the same gardener who made the first attempt. When searched at the police station a pocket book was found full of money, which, although good, was proven to have been stolen from a lady several days ago.

W. F. PRICE DIES SUDDENLY

Former Resident of Texas Expires at Guadalajara.

Special Dispatch to The Herald. Guadalajara, April 26.—Wesley F. Price, a former resident of Sabin, Texas, died suddenly at a boarding house here, his death resulting from a complication of tuberculosis and heart disease. He started to leave the boarding house in company with his brother, J. F. Price of Dawson, Alaska, and at the door suddenly collapsed. Medical assistance reached him. Mr. Price came to this state several months ago, and went into the territory adjacent to San Marcos, where he denounced considerable mineral land. It was his intention to engage in mining in this section. He was fifty-four years of age, and was formerly in mercantile business in Sabin. Mr. Price's mother arrived here a few days ago to visit him.

TOOK DOSE OF STRYCHNINE

Despondent, Young Man of Monterey Attempts Suicide.

Cook, until a few days ago an employe in the mechanical department of the Monterey News, attempted suicide night before last by taking a heavy dose of strychnine in his apartments at the price boarding house, where he and his wife have been staying since coming to this city some time ago. Mr. Cook was a native of Albany, Texas, and it is reported held an important position in San Antonio before coming here. After coming here he is said to have started to drinking heavily, and finally losing his position, became despondent and made the unsuccessful attempt of night before last. A physician was called and took immediate steps to counteract the effects of the deadly poison, and after a short while had Cook in condition to be moved by the order of the authorities to the Gonzalez hospital, where he is now being cared for.

REV. MR. FULLER AND WIFE TO LIVE IN MONTEREY.



AUTO REGULATIONS WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.

CONVICTED OF HOMICIDE HE MUST SERVE TWENTY YEARS.

Guadalajara, April 26.—Wenceslao Martinez, convicted of qualified homicide, who was given the final sentence of twenty-years' imprisonment, has received the favor of being allowed on his sentence the time consumed in the trial computed from the date on which his imprisonment was formally decreed.

SMALLPOX SCARE AT TOWN OF SALLA BARRANCA.

Special Dispatch to The Herald. Veracruz, April 26.—A smallpox plague has lately developed at the town of Salta Barranca, belonging to this canton, and the authorities have ordered that Dr. George Ruiz, the physician of the canton, leave for that point to bring about the suppression of the pest.

UNVEILING OF PORTRAIT

Velada at Puebla in Honor of Dr. Ignacio Guzman.

Puebla, April 26.—At a velada which took place some nights ago in the maternity and infancy hospital in honor of Dr. Ignacio Guzman, who was director of that establishment, the portrait of that medical man, which the state government ordered hung in one of the principal halls of the hospital, was unveiled with the proper ceremonies. Several young women made speeches, and Dr. Antonio Vilchis Barbosa, a professor of the institution, delivered the principal address.

JEFE POLITICO ATTACKED BY DRUNKARD ON CAR.

Puebla, April 26.—The jefe politico of Cholula, Javier Cordoba, who has been in this city for several days on official business, while travelling in a trolley car, was attacked by a drunken man who came aboard at one of the stops and rushed upon him with a drawn dagger. Fortunately he managed to escape from his assailant, who declared when interrogated in the comisaria that he had mistaken the official for another person.

SUB-INSPECTOR LEAVES TO INVESTIGATE POACHING.

Guadalajara, April 26.—For the purpose of investigating the poaching of fish in the River Lerma which has been practiced for a long time with impunity, the sub-inspector of forests, Jose E. Cambero, has left on commission from the department of fomento, to make an inspection along the banks of the river Lerma and report thereon to that department.

SCHOOL FESTIVALS GENERALLY SUCCESSFUL.

JOSE SANCHEZ APPOINTED GOVERNOR AD INTERIM.
