VICENTE SEGURA WILL RETIRE FROM BULL RING



Vicente Segura, the millionaire bullfighter, who recently returned from Spain, where he was severely hurt in the Madrid plaza, states that he will retire from the bullring altogether and devote his time, in the future to his large business interests.

The decision of Segura to leave the ring, will cause a great deal of regret among the aficionados with whom Segura is a prime favorite.

Segura shares the honors with Gaona as the best of the Mexican matadores and was the first to receive the alternative in a Madrid plaza. While not so graceful perhaps with the cape as Gaona, with the sword, he has few superiors. Courage, he has and to spare, scarcely knowing the word fear. He took

to fighting bulls from pure liking for the sport, and never from necessity, and while he accepted pay for his services, and became a professional, most of his earnings went for charity.

A native of Pachuca, Segura's career in the bull fighting business, has been notable. Appearing a few times in rings in Mexico, he went to Spain, and in a short time demonstrated his worth and received the bullfighter's degree, in Madrid, before the king and the count of Spain.

He will now go back to his business, having risen to the top rung of the profession. He may appear once more in this city, but there is no certainty of this as he says that he will quit for all time, and only fight bulls in the future, for pleasure and at benefit performances.

KAISER WILHELM WILL HAVE HIS SALARY INCREASED

Berlin, June 3.—The civil list of the emperor as king of Prussia, is soon to be increased, probably to about \$5,000,000. This was agreed upon today by the leaders of the Conservative, National, Liberal and Radical parties of the Prussian parliament. A bill embodying the necessary legislation will be introduced by the government shortly.
Emperor William, who receives nothing from the empire, experienced difficulty during recent years in meeting the demands on his allowances from the Prussian kingdom. These allowances amount at present to \$3,925,000, an increase of \$75,000 having been made in 1889.

WELL KNOWN FRENCH TURFMAN IS TO RETIRE
SAYS THAT FRENCH RACING IS AMERICANIZED.

New York, June 3.—It was news in racing circles here today that Edmond Vell Pickard, one of the best known figures on the French turf has decided to give up his famous racing stud.
The reasons Pickard gives for his decision are of interest to American racing men. His first reason is that the French turf is becoming "Americanized," which means, he says, that the doping of horses has been introduced and that the great racing colors, which were formerly the glory of French race horses have been banished.
He denounces the interference of the state in racing affairs and says that the clubs are powerless to put a stop to evil practices of the turf because state authorities prevent owners from disciplining the jockeys properly. It has become well nigh impossible, he says, to preserve honest French racing.
NO INTEREST TAKEN IN TENNIS IN CITY
FALL TOURNAMENT MAY NOT COME OFF THIS YEAR.
The game of tennis, as far as the fall tournament is concerned, seems to be dead in this city, and it is probable that there will be no tournament this fall.
The tournament this year was originally set for April, as usual, but was postponed till fall. In making arrangements for the tournament no heart has been put into the affair and no one has taken an active lead in the matter.
When the MacQuiston brothers were residents of the city, tennis was one of the leading sports. These two kept the game alive not only by their own playing, but by active work in arranging for tournaments. Twice they successfully engineered international tournaments and the interest
