JEFFRIES INDIGNANT OVER PRESS REPORT

DENIAL OF GILLETTE STORY RESTORES CALM.

CHAMPION PUTS IN A QUIET DAY AND GOES FISHING.

Jeffries, when he was shown an interview sent out by a news agency from Chicago, quoting Governor James N. Gillette as saying that the Jeffries-Johnson fight was "frame up" and arranged for the white man to win.

Heart and Soul in Fight. "You boys who have seen me working up here must know that my heart and soul are in the coming scrap and it does not stand to reason that I would break my neck working, if everything was settled for me to win. I wonder what I have ever done in the ring, or in my other walk of life, to be accused of crookedness. I quit the fighting game once because I did not care for those crooked fellows who were continually rapping it, and now this story has come, it is enough to break a man up."

Jeffries Denies Story. A signed statement was issued by Jeffries today on the recent discussion as to the possible retirement of Tex Rickard as referee and the substitution of Eddie Smith. "The statement follows: 'In reference to the referee matter my opinion is this: I have accepted Rickard after giving my preference for Smith. After accepting Mr. Rickard, in whom I have every confidence, I cannot very well ask him to resign. He is good enough for me. But in the event of his not wishing to act, if it is his feeling that it is against the best interests of the match for him to officiate, then Mr. Smith is acceptable to me. This, however, is decidedly up to Mr. Rickard, as I cannot accept a man and then ask him to resign. Either man is acceptable to me.' (Signed) 'JAMES J. JEFFRIES.'"

GORONER'S JURY FIXES BLAME ON STREET CAR

Associated Press Dispatch. Chicago, June 3.—A coroner's jury has laid at the doors of the Chicago traction company the responsibility for the death of George A. McDonald, sporting editor of the Chicago Evening Journal, killed when the automobile of John J. Evers, second baseman for the Cubs, a week ago, was struck by a street car.

The jury found that the automobile was moving at a moderate rate of speed, was in good condition and under perfect control. It finds that the street car was running at a dangerously high rate of speed and that this rate of speed was made necessary by the street railways company's schedule, fixing the running time for a distance of four miles, at only thirty minutes.

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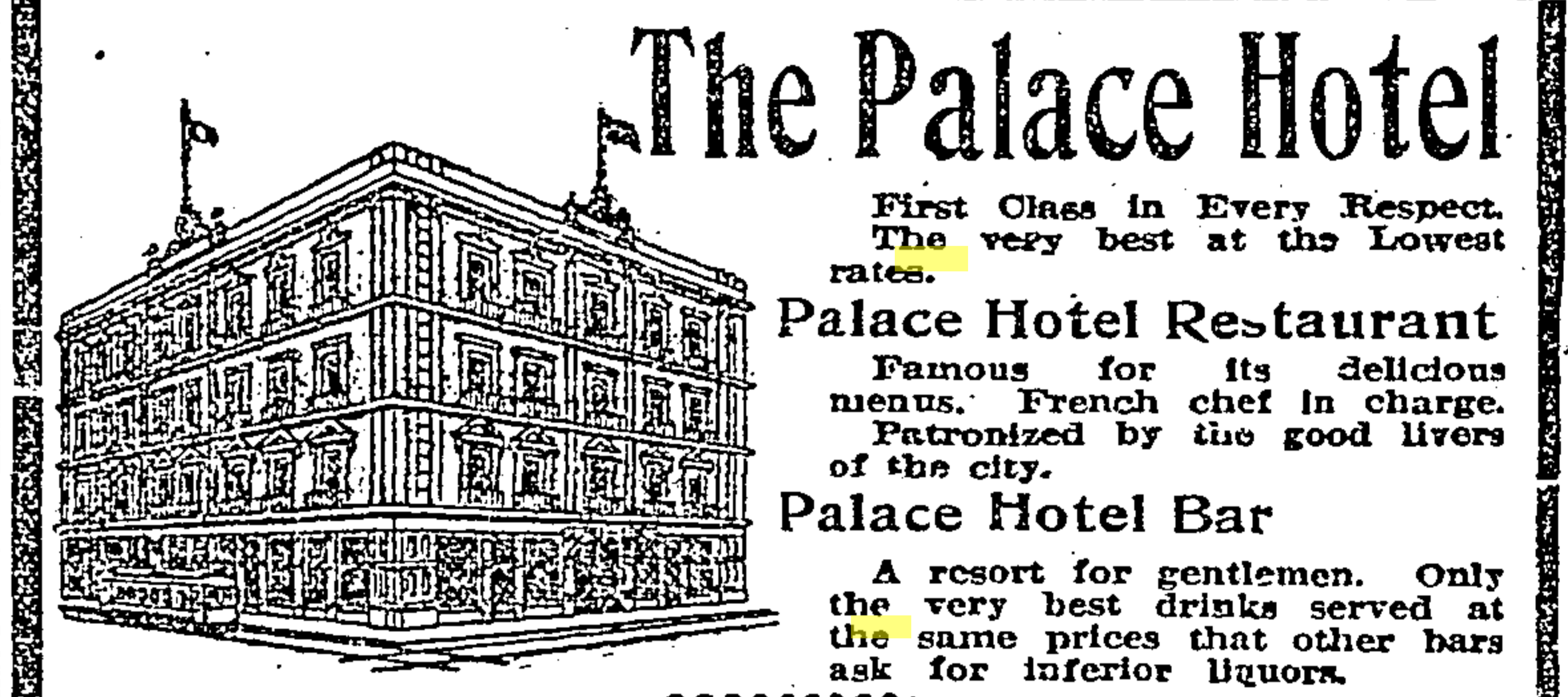
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
