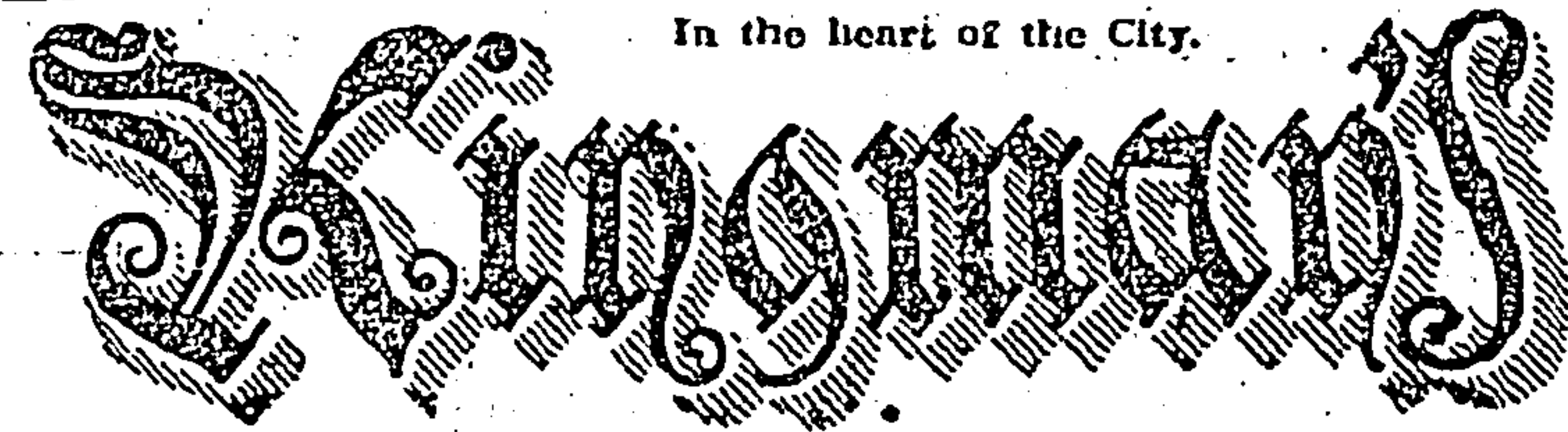

NECAXA JUNKET IS A GREAT SUCCESS

Party Pleased with Hospitality Dispensed by General Manager.

PRESIDENT DELIGHTED

Mr. Madero Takes Trip over Falls on Aerial Tram.

Members of the party accompanying President Madero on his visit to the power plant of the Mexico Light and Power company when seen yesterday in their expressions of admiration for the immensity of the undertaking and of appreciation of the hospitality dispensed by the company through its general manager, Harro Harssen, who accompanied the party.

The party was formed of about sixty persons, including the president, Ernesto Madero, minister of finance; Manuel Bonilla, minister of communications; Pedro Lascurain, minister of foreign relations, the British, Russian, Italian and German ministers and many other persons prominent in diplomatic and political circles.

A train conveying 200 soldiers preceded the presidential special train, which was followed by one containing a force of rurales. Every town along the line of route was gaily decorated and the inhabitants turned out en masse to greet the party.

The entire day on Sunday was spent inspecting the dams and power stations, the president personally showing the greatest interest in everything. The largest station is accessible either by tunnels or by steel cages slung on cables, the latter journey being made in two stages, the first drop being 750 feet and the second 320.

The president went out to the power house by the mid-air route later returning by the tunnels. He also inspected the reservoirs which contain 171,417,000 cubic meters of water, and the two proposed dams which are being built with the object of adding about 70 per cent storage supply.

The Necaxa dam was also visited by the party. This dam is the second largest in the world being surpassed in size only by the Gatun dam at Panama. Its breast is two miles long. The power houses on the property are four in number and are capable of producing 96,330 horse power.

The president expressed great pleasure in all that he saw, and warmly thanked Mr. Harssen for the hospitality shown him. He said that he congratulated those in charge of the project which he considered as one of the marvels of the republic. He was also pointed out that the fact that no attempt had been made by rebels to destroy any part of the project showed that the revolutionaries were not directing their efforts against the property of foreigners.

LECTURE ON LAST CAMPAIGN OF CUSTER

Major Harry S. Bryan Will Speak at Y. M. C. A.

The Y. M. C. A. lecture committee has secured Major Harry S. Bryan for the next number in its regular lecture course. Major Bryan will lecture Friday evening on "Custer's Last Campaign." Over fifty lantern slides will be used to illustrate the lecture. Many of the photographs which will be shown were taken only a few months after the death of Gen. Custer and many officers, as well as Indian chiefs, are included in them. The lecturer will speak from personal experience in the Indian campaigns and his personal acquaintance with the famous Indian fighters will give special interest to the lecture.

PEACE AND AMITY WORK IS HIGHLY COMMENDED

An enthusiastic meeting of the International Committee of Peace and Amity was held last night at the law offices of Lic. Demetrio Salazar. It was decided to push the work commenced so auspiciously with the velada on the night of the Fourth of July.

At the meeting last night a report was made by James Carson as chairman of the press committee, and the subject matter for an illustrated booklet was presented for the consideration of committee. This booklet will give the history of the work of the committee and will be illustrated. It is planned, as soon as the book is ready, to send a copy to every member of the United States Congress and to every member of the Mexican Congress, as well as to governors of the states of the United States and of the republic of Mexico.

As an evidence of how the work is being received, the following three letters will show.
