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ALL SOULS DAY IS OBSERVED IN CITY

Throngs Visit Cemeteries to Place Flowers on Graves of the Departed.

SERVICES IN CHURCHES.

Special Requiem Masses Are Celebrated.

All Souls' Day was observed in the Catholic churches of the city with impressive ceremonies. The altars were draped in black and the priests wore vestments of the same color. In nearly all the parish churches catafalques were erected in the main aisle, in front of the high altar. These catafalques were covered with black drapery and surrounded with lighted candles.

At the cathedral the catafalque was an immense structure, rising to a height of about fifteen feet above the floor. It was draped with rich black velvet, trimmed with gold, and surmounted with a massive silver crucifix. The high altar of the cathedral, as well as the altars of all the chapels of the great edifice, were draped in somber black, with trimmings of golden braid.

From 5 o'clock in the morning until the last masses were finished about 12:30, all the churches were visited by great throngs of worshippers. At the high masses the services were extremely touching; the plaintive notes of the organ chants adding to the solemnity of the services. Special services in commemoration of the deceased members of the English speaking parish were conducted at the church of San Lorenzo by Rev. J. A. Reis, pastor. The services were well attended.

Reduced Attendance. The fact that the pilgrimages to the cemeteries were extended over two days, instead of being confined to a single day, as in former years, served to account for the reduced attendance at the various cemeteries yesterday. However, crowds were large and the cars of the Mexico Tramway Company, Ltd., which were operated on a special schedule throughout the day, were well filled on every trip. It was not possible for the company to see all the passengers from Dolores and the Spanish cemeteries back to the city until late in the evening. This was due to the fact that thousands of persons remained at the cemeteries until dark, as they hoped to get late cars back to the city.

Flowers on Reyes' Tomb. At the Tepic cemetery the tomb of General Bernardo Reyes, who was killed during the attack to the National Palace, February 9, was tastefully decorated. Mrs. Aurelia Ochoa de Reyes, widow of the general, and several other members of his family visited the grave during the day, as well as many friends.

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were also placed upon the neatly trimmed grass plots above the tombs. But even in the Spanish cemetery there was noticeable a less lavish expenditure of flowers and candles in commemoration of the dead than in former years. Large crowds passed through the gates of the Spanish cemetery during the day.

The grave of the late former Vice-president Jose Maria Pino Suarez in the Spanish cemetery also was covered by wreaths of flowers. These were placed by members of the Yucatan colony who were friends of the deceased.

The American cemetery, adjoining the Spanish cemetery, was visited during the past two days, by a number of persons who have relatives interred there. Americans and other English speaking persons have experienced great difficulty in obtaining flowers for the decoration of the graves of their dead. For this reason, only a small proportion of those who went to the American cemetery were able to deposit floral tributes.

The cemetery is well kept and appears to be in better condition than for some time past. There is plenty of water and the grass and flowers are watered regularly and the whole aspect of the cemetery shows the care which is being taken with it.

Most of the business houses of the city remained closed all day in honor of the Day of the Dead. Only the smaller grocery stores and cantinas and a few stores in the center of the city were open during the morning. Many of these closed during the afternoon. The banks were closed all day.


